Grounded in the liberal arts and embedded in Providence College's Catholic and Dominican tradition, the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program provides an innovative and rigorous academic curriculum that encompasses theoretical and clinical coursework leading to evidence-based nursing practice. With a focus on students' personal and professional growth, our nursing curriculum fosters critical thinking and decision-making abilities, along with the technically advanced knowledge and skills needed to be successful as registered nurses practicing in diverse healthcare settings. Under the direction of highly qualified, experienced, and cross-disciplinary faculty, students will complete a variety of required courses in the nursing program and choose electives from several other disciplinary fields. Carefully chosen clinical experiences at prominent local, regional, national, and international healthcare settings will prepare students to care for patients and families in ways that promote human dignity and flourishing.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.)

The new Bachelor of Science in Nursing program provides best-in-class nursing education. The major requires 22 nursing and health science courses for 76 credits. This includes nine clinical experiences for 35 credits. Additional courses will satisfy the college's core curriculum, Development of Western Civilization, and elective requirements. Coursework is designed to provide an innovative educational experience for students and graduates to share the global mission of Providence College with the world community and its diverse populations.





PEOPLE AND PLACES

When completed in early 2025, the Ben Mondor Center or Nursing and Health Sciences will be the academic hub for the school, and it will house state-of-the-art teaching and learning environments for clinical nursing simulation, anatomy and physiology labs, a student resource center, faculty innovation labs, a chapel, and countless other spaces to support engaged learning.

Outside of the classroom, students will have many opportunities to display their talents and clinical competencies in nursing care. PC nursing students will engage in providing health and nursing care in the vibrant Providence and Rhode Island healthcare community; in leading U.S. healthcare centers, such as Boston, New York and Philadelphia, and globally through service-learning initiatives, while earning credit toward their nursing degree.
